

SICSA funded workshop - CIAO 2013

The 22nd CIAO workshop was held at The Burn, Brechin, and included participants from 3 Scottish Universities – namely Dundee, Heriot-Watt and Edinburgh – and from Universities elsewhere in Europe, including Oxford University and the German Research Centre for Artificial Intelligence in Bremen, and Chalmers University in Gothenburg. The workshop consisted of two days of presentations, with time in between filled with discussions about complementary research.

The SICSA CSE theme funded subsistence for 5 PhD students based in Scottish Universities. These were chosen by the organisers from the applicants based on available grant money. In many cases PhD students have no money attached to their grant to go to conferences and workshops, and so the help from SICSA proved invaluable. Each accepted PhD student was required to give a talk, all of which were very well received and in many cases promoted greater potential links between universities. Each PhD student was asked to write a short paragraph detailing how they benefitted from attending the workshop. These are included below.
